What is a Navigator?

The Navigator program is a peer helper training course. Navigators are people with disabilities who are trained to help others with disabilities:

- Become more independent
- Increase self-confidence

Achieve goals for Quality of life

- Employment
- Training
- Volunteering

Who is Eligible?

To qualify for the program, you must:

- Have a physical disability (self identified)
- Have Aboriginal ancestry & live on reserve
- Be willing to help others
- Attend a 6 week training program (2 days/week)
- Complete a criminal records search
- Apply to become a Navigator

Why become a Navigator?

Benefits to being a Navigator:

- Learn about your own strengths
- Give back to your community
- Get support from others
- Mileage/daycare subsidy during training
- Add experience to resume
- Find a new career path
- Navigators will have access to and assistance with computers and other types of technology in order to help their peers.
